### TĀ TE KAITUHI WRITER'S NOTES

### TE WEHI RATANA NGĀTI RAUKAWA & TE ARAWA

Excerpt from an essay in the pukapuka Te Waka Hourua Whītiki, Mātike, Whakatika!

'I want to ask you a few questions:

- Do you believe that we can achieve what needs to be achieved within the confines of legal change making actions, ie; submissions, marching, voting, etc?
- Is our current society set up in a way that embraces positive social change through legal means whether it be legal protest or other forms?
- Did the people who created present society, and do the people who currently maintain it actually give a shit about anything other than wealth and power?

My answer to all 3 is unsurprisingly a solid no. Present society is a social construct. It has been pieced together with systems put in place by mostly wealthy, powerful, white men for at least the last 2000 years,



with no other purpose than to build wealth and power for those same men. While some people say the system is broken, I have a different thought. I am of the thinking that our current system, political and economic, is operating exactly how it was intended to, extracting all the wealth and resources from the masses and then they'll fuck off to Mars when they can extract no more.

It's time for us to try the other approach.

Since taking action at Te Papa Tongarewa I have spent time in prison and am still under very strict bail conditions. There are lessons that can be learnt from these current experiences. Lessons I can share to help others who want to do the same. I do not fear what will happen or when I take action, I fear what will happen if I don't.

# TATERINGATOHU KAITUHI DIRECTOR WRITER'S NOTES TAINUI TUKIWAHO TUHOE & TE ARAWA

When I first heard Te Wehi's story, I was inspired. Not just by the bold action taken at Te Papa—though that was undeniably cool—but by what unfolded afterward, in prison. The way something powerful and beautiful could emerge even in the most unforgiving of places.

To me, this story is like a sliver of light breaking through the heavy darkness that surrounds the Treaty—cutting through the meanness, the hate, the lies, and the deceit. People like Te Wehi and Te Waka Hourua stand in defiance of these forces, often forced to fight fire with fire. And as we all know, fire usually leaves nothing but ashes. But not this time.

At its core, ration the Queen's veges is an exploration of truth and lies. The way history is told, the way it is remembered, and the way it is conveniently forgotten. It's about uncertainty, about the feeling of being caught in a story bigger than yourself, where the ground keeps shifting beneath you.

But this isn't a lecture. You won't find musings on the Treaty or a rundown of modern politics. There are no carefully curated social media takes here—go online for that. What you will find is something absurd, something that unsettles and surprises, something that asks questions rather than offering easy answers.

This show is for those who need a break from weight of fighting for our rights to be - for those who know that, no matter what, we will always find a way to respond.
